Hi all,
Hope this newsletter finds you in good health. There is so much going on it is impossible to keep up with. First let me say that besides a somewhat small turnout at Twain, those that were able to attend enjoyed themselves. Those that looked for gold found some. We all enjoyed the opportunity to see old friends.

The legal front is where the action is, with several court cases in action as we speak. The courts have ruled that polluting a stream or river requires the addition of pollutants and that moving polluted water from one portion of the stream to another does not constitute adding pollution (as in suction dredging). So we win in this case. But as we speak the state water board is in the process of killing dredging altogether. The state water board is handing over control of the rivers in the state to the federal government. The purpose of the move is to acquire the monies from the government for the clean up of these rivers. Over 4100 waterways in the state of California have been deemed as impaired for one or more pollutants. By being in the control of the Feds the cash strapped state of California would be entitled to federal monies to clean up these rivers. Over 1400 people over a two-year period were poisoned in California resulting in 2 deaths. During the same timeframe not one person was poisoned by mercury. So why is there a big rush to impose mercury regulations? Keep up the fight.

The Bull Creek outing is approaching and I hope to see you there. I just returned from bull creek and the report is LOW water. We will be limited to panning since running a sluice will be out of the question. This will be a time for pans, metal detectors, and an opportunity to relax. If there is enough interest I will put on a detector hunt. Currently campfires are still ok with a permit. Our buddies with the forest service have placed boulders at each end of the campground in an attempt to keep the quads off the trail, but have succeeded in blocking the whole shaded area under the giant oak at the east end of the campground and forced the quads to create a new trail from the roadway and deny access by those using wheel chairs, we believe they took the boulders they used from a local mining claim. ALERT

The National Forest Service is advising prospectors to be alert for bears and take extra precautions to avoid an encounter. Prospectors are advised to wear little bells on their clothes so they make noise when hiking. The bell noise allows bears to hear the Prospectors coming from a distance and not be startled by Prospectors accidentally sneaking up on them, as this may cause a bear to charge.

Prospectors should also carry a can of pepper spray just in case a bear is encountered. Spraying the pepper into the air will irritate the bear's sensitive nose and it will run away.

It is also a good idea to keep an eye out for fresh bear scat so you have an idea if bears are in the area. Prospectors should be able to recognize the difference between black bear and grizzly bear scat. Black bear droppings are smaller and often contain berries, leaves, and possibly bits of fur. Grizzly bear droppings tend to contain small bells and smell of pepper.

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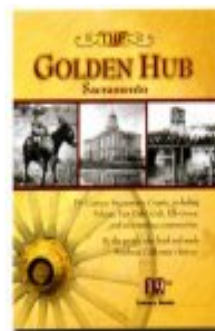

AMERICAN MINING RIGHTS ASSOCIATION

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Well everyone, we finally have our website up and operational. Although we said our site would be up and running a few months ago, we underestimated the amount of time it takes to program a complex site like ours. Our website is americanminingrights.com and we are pretty pleased with how it turned out.

We are currently calling and partnering with gold clubs all across America and have even reached out to, and formed alliances with some off-road organizations. Remember, we are all fighting the same fight and that is an all-out assault on our access to public lands and our ability to mine those lands. We are also planning on attending the Gold Show in Reno Nevada in August.

Here are a couple of things we are working on currently. 1. A man on the Yuba who lost his claims to a “power withdrawal” ruling from BLM. The claims have been in his family for 62 years. 2. We are working on another case involving a designation on a “historical site” and a claim which is being taken back by BLM because someone found a square nail from the 1850’s. 3. We are working with UPI and Coarsegold on Bull Creek and the blocking of campgrounds and trails. I cannot disclose what avenue we are taking yet as we plan for it to be a surprise to these Government entities (never show your hand).

I recently attended a meeting in Auburn with Defend Rural America, PLP and the Western Mining Alliance. WMA has written a very good letter back to DFG regarding their move to enact “emergency rulemaking” on suction dredging. Now, keep in mind WMA sent them a letter (certified) requesting to be included in and provide input on this so called emergency as per DFG regulations and their own laws. DFG ignored WMA’s request to be a part of any talks, but they DID include environmental and green groups to give all the feedback and input they wanted.in a closed door meeting. That’s right; the mining community was excluded from any and all discussions on this emergency rulemaking even though it severely impacts the mining industry. These are the kind of issue’s we face folks, and unless we unite and start litigation on these illegal acts, our passion will go away. This has never been about the yellow legged frog (which by the way they just set aside 2.2 million acres for their preservation, more on that in a later edition), salmon or some purple footed, blue eyed, diaper baby beetle. They just use those as an excuse. They know they cannot break the 1871 and 1872 mining laws so they seek a way around them via regulation, wild and scenic listings, endangered species act, solar and wind development, historical designations or just ceding their powers over to another agency which can shut down public lands. As an example, DFG now wants to cede its regulatory authority to the water board. The water board says it will take over the control of permits to run a water pump (think high bankers) in a creek, river, pond, mud puddle or even a ditch. But they have already stated they will NOT issue a permit. That would shut down high banking and even private property owners who want to pump water from their own ponds will not be able to if this goes through. Are you getting the feeling time is of the essence? It is.

We’d like to tackle many other issues, but since our website was just brought “live” a week ago, we do not have the funds. We encourage you to join us, the gold is waiting and there is still water on most of our claims. We have some videos we are working on; one in particular is how to choose a spot. One of the biggest opportunities I see from new miners is they can dig in a spot for a week and get a few flakes, where some of us more experienced miners can pull a quarter ounce in a day 50 feet from where they were digging. That will be a good video, and I plan to shoot it on one of our claims this week. As promised, I braved the poison oak and shot panoramic videos of all of our claims (except one so far) and you can find them on our site.

It’s not all doom and gloom, the scandals hitting the Whitehouse and the party which always seems to try and shut us down is losing momentum. This immigration bill has all of us deeply worried. Remember to be heard, call your Representative or Senator and let them know how you feel.

I’m hoping to get out seeing you folks on your next outing, but we are picking up claims in Arizona and I’m headed that way soon. We are also looking at claims in Oregon, Georgia and Nevada.

Join us, tell everyone you know about us and let’s fight their agenda they have tooth and nail.

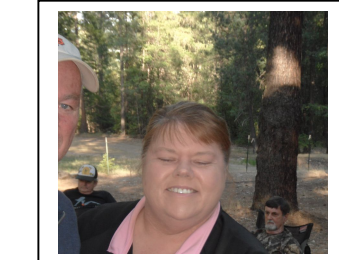
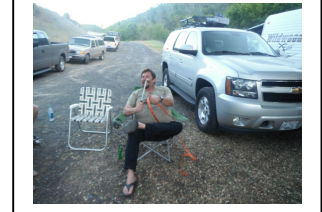

Assistant Claims Manager Report

Purchasing your next piece of mining equipment.

The next time you walk into the local mining store looking for some new equipment or just browsing and you see Billy Bob's sure fire gold gettin' machine, your eyes get all bugged out, and your jaw drops open. You start dreaming of the pounds of gold that you will recover with that new-fangled machine. Taking a look at the price tag you say wow and the wallet in your back pocket or purse puckers up real tight. You start thinking, I got a roll of balin' wire, couple rolls of duct tape some rusty old nails, screws, and a bunch of boards from the old outhouse that blew over in that big storm last year. Looks simple enough, bet I could build me one just like it. Three or four months down the road you are still struggling putting it together, taking trips to the hardware store for more parts, and it is still not working just like the one in the store.

We often fail to realize that what you are looking at in the mining store is not of Billy Bob's first try at building his or her gold gettin' machine. There's a workshop full of stuff that leads up to a commercial product. Of course Billy Bob will continue to improve and refine the machine to make it better. Billy Bob spent a lot of money and countless hours tinkering and making changes on the machine. An example is the Gold cube; the inventor said that he had spent \$21,000 before the first one came out of the mold. Getting someone to build a mold can be quite expensive. Machine shops and mold makers have lots of expensive equipment and experienced workers to run it. All of this does not come cheap. Frank at Pioneer Mining Supply in Auburn said the inventor of the Blue bowl spent around \$26,000 to make the molds. No one knows how many changes in the design came before final product. When it comes time for commercial production these things do not just jump into the box ready for delivery. There are hours spent cutting, bending, welding, bolting, riveting, filing down sharp edges, and making the product safe and reliable. Finally it is assembled into boxes for delivery to the consumer.

So getting back to Billy Bob's gold gettin' machine. After you spent all those months working on your version, how much gold did you put in your pocket? Oh, sorry about that, I forgot you spent the whole summer building yours. I have been there a few times myself. I thought about building a gold cube cause I had the parts and some old outhouse boards layin' around. I assessed the time I would spend recreating it, and all the other projects I have cooking that would slow down the process. I had the advantage of the Tech Shop at my disposal, which would make it easier. Decided my other projects took priority and I really wanted to get out finding gold. So I unpuckered my wallet, negotiated a price at the gold show, and I was up and running the next day. A decision I do not regret one bit. Now, before you wrestle that wallet out of your back pocket or purse and pry some money or plastic out of it, you have some serious research to do.

DO YOUR HOMEWORK, KNOW WHAT YOU ARE BUYING!

Talk to your friends and check the forums. Get some answers and not just one opinion. When I bought the cube, there were three positive votes and one negative. I saw the kind of gold that was coming out of it, and figured that for my application it would be perfect. Look for quality. For instance, if it's a sluice box, which has a number of manufactures, check out several, how they are put together, gauge of metal, and ease of clean up. Are there any small parts that can be lost during clean up? Same goes for high bankers or other mining equipment. You want to be sure that there are no funky or weak parts that will fail somewhere way out in the woods that will shut you down. No sharp edges to cut you when mining. This is one sign that the builder did not just throw this thing together. He or she put some quality time into producing it. Does it have a gas engine, is it a reliable manufacturer? Sometimes they will slip one of those Harbor Freight motors in. Those motors are heavy and not always above low quality. I still buy from Harbor Freight but I know that Chicago electric tools will not last as long as Ryobi or old Milwaukee. Also, your friends will tell you what they thought of theirs and any problems it had. Once you have assessed all of this you can feel good about plunking down the cash and all those pounds of gold sitting in the gravel are going to find a new home.

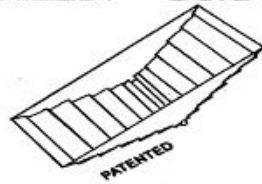
