UNITED PROSPECTORS INC. MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Don Siegel August 2007

Hi Miners! I have 3 topics to cover today that are very simple:

 Our organization really needs your involvement. Every year we hold elections to fill positions on our board and every year we struggle to find members who want to get involved and help us run our great organization. The UPI board is not government but without guidance the organization will falter. Your board members always try to have you, the membership, in mind when making decisions and your input would really help us in our goal of keeping UPI a strong and fun organization.

2) Sit down right now and write a letter to your Governor. AB 1032 will be heading to his desk soon and we need him to VETO this bill. The passing of this bill will give the Dept. of Fish and Game the power to decide which streams we can and can not dredge. The permit systems that exist now would become impossible for the average miner to obtain. (Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, State Capitol Building, Sacramento CA 95814. You must include your name, address and sign the letter)

3) Call your chapter leader or check in with the Talk and Trade and find out what is going on out there in place of the scheduled outing at Bull Creek. As you may know we are in the midst of a severe drought and Bull Creek is bone dry. The fire danger is extreme. I know that many have done very well mining under these conditions but in the interest of safety we will not have our scheduled outing this month. The next outing will be held at Twain and we will hold our elections at that time. A sample ballot is in this newsletter for your review.

THE OUTING

The drive up the valley Friday morning was a pleasant drive. The traffic moved quite smoothly all the way to the Greenville exit. The only glitch was in Marysville for some reason, it was much slower than usual. On the way up I pulled into Twain and did a quick look about to see if there were some campers on the claim, which is usual for the Genesee outings. The weather was cooperating and there was no need for the artificial environment of the air conditioning keeping the fuel economy up. In fact the entire weekend weather was just about perfect as I viewed it, though the members who were dredging may disagree.

Upon arriving at Camp 1, the original claim site, there was a little dismay in that only two other camps were set up, Chet and the Letlows. Of course it was early, just barely noon, as I recall, so no big deal, the day was young. Then too there were the other campsites further on up the road where some of the members prefer to camp because of accessibility and ease of getting their dredges into the water and get working. As it turned out there were a number of members camped up stream bringing the member number count up. The roll call shows that there were 27 members and guests present at the Potluck Raffle. Considering all of the curves and knuckle-balls Mother Nature and the USFS had been throwing at us, coupled with the price of fuel and the quick venue changes, "we done good."

The fire that put the damper on the July 4th outing scheduled for Genesee was kind to us in the respect that it didn't gut the claim of tress. Babcock Crossing and the last mile east of Babcock took the biggest hit, and it wasn't all that bad thank goodness. Our steel marker post at the most easterly end of the claims survived, the claim numbers could still be read. (See picture on Page 9) There were a few spots down stream from Babcock that were hit but not that bad, just some spot fires here and there.

Absent: Rita Perry, Gerald Hurt, and Chris Perry



Minutes: Chet Chastain made a motion to approve the minutes, Sid Parrish seconded the motion, motion carried.

- Treasurer, Aaron Matula: Don said in Aaron's defense they have had some information from the bank that has made it very hard to transfer the signature and passwords from Samantha to Aaron. The way the process has been working is Don and Tom have been signing checks and mailing them to Aaron and he is paying the bills and keeping track. After we get everything running full speed he will be able to take the data and input it. One thing is we are going to be late on our taxes and we are going to owe a \$50 fine. We are also due the audit, every two years we are suppose to do an audit. The last audit was 2005 and 2006 the next audit should be 2008. We need to contact Beverly Paul and research a little more to find out what is due at this time. The report will not include the bank statement. The beginning balance is \$14,453.17, the month of July we had \$2,368 in deposits, outstanding checks \$2,004.04, subtotal \$14,817.13. Aaron is going to find someone closer to help with the audit.
- Membership, Denise Matula: Total count of life members is 63, advertisers 35, regulars are 326, and we have a total of 424.
- · Wagon Master, Steve Letlow: Has an invoice for the last Genesee outing. Send Aaron a copy of the receipts for the port-a-potties.
- · Outing Coordinator, Christa Eastland: No report.
- Ways and Means, Sid Parrish: Pioneer Mining has paid with items. Gold Mine paid with even extra items. 49er wants to upgrade his advertising. Ways and Means to notify Editor-n-Chief then to membership. Sporting Good shops would be a great idea to have them in our advertising. RCM purchased the sluice box and the re-circulating sluice box with personal items, I will be the next meeting submit with lining off my personal items from the receipt if I don't hear from him. I want to gear up now for next year advertisers. Dennis Kates has the pyramid pan, that at first no one knew what to do with, now everybody wants one. He is going to bring a couple to our Twain Outing. Also, getting license plates.
- · Grievance/Political, Gerald Hurt: Absent.
- · Technical Advisor: Absent.
- Editor, Bill Reboin: We have three- half page of advertisers; if we are going to be looking for quantity maybe we should do a classified type ad for \$75 a year. In terms of Cindy, unless she decides to accept a Directorship she has to be listed as a volunteer. I have asked Mark to add her to the website as assistant to the Editor-n-Chief/Publisher as volunteer. As far as my retirement is concerned it will be from month to month.
- Chapters, Tom Eastland: No recent activity. Michael Phillips is asking to update the driving directions. Find out specifically what they
 don't understand. Contra-Costa Chapter is very active but it doesn't seem to be part of UPI. I hear a lot of the Chapter Chairman say let's
 support UPI. I never see any of the members of this Chapter come to the UPI outings. Ed is successful with his group. Alameda County
 Chapter, Steve K. does not want to be listed as a contact person.
- Claims, Chet Chastain: The expense report, Plumas County Affidavits, Placer County Affidavits and Tax Collectors, and Eldorado County Affidavits, these are the annual papers I have to file to show a continued interest in the claims. The BLM I paid the rental fee for 20 claims, \$2,500 and mileage all of which were offset by the prepayment at Bull Creek of \$4,033. I put an expense summary that netted \$60.62 for ten claim signs at Pioneer Mining. The bottom part of the reconciliation showed the offset out of that \$4,033 remains \$1,234.21. The following numbers, I may have misrecorded them, so I have to go back and verify them. I may have miscalculated the expense for mileage. I left off some postage. The Mariposa County Taxes for the Bull Creek Claim was \$70.00;the Sierra County Taxes for Clippership was \$148.84; the Plumas County Taxes for 12 claims was \$572.06; the Sierra County Recorder, I went to Downieville and paid the taxes for Clippership and filed the affidavits while I was there was 191 miles, which my rough calculation was \$67.06. Totaling \$869.96 which will all come out of the original \$4,033. I will still owe the board reconciliation on the remainder which is \$364.15. When I go Siskiyou County it is anticipated it will be around 800 miles roundtrip, and the taxes will be around \$70 range and copy and affidavit recordation around \$13 to \$15. Salmon River is to change the By-Laws, to be brought before the membership to the effect that we cannot allow individual members to negotiate individual agreements with the National Forest that involve UPI claims. It is impossible to negotiate with the Forest and what I believe was a standing agreement with the Six Rivers National Forest, and a member come up and completely undo it by doing their own NOI, and we don't have a copy of what was submitted, we don't have any physical evidence



Some of the members had some pretty good finds of the elusive yellow metal. Ken Liddell found the largest nugget that I saw. He calls it the taco nugget because it was folded like a taco shell. There were other members that found respectable quantities of the metal. It was all mostly of the flat rice grained sized material typical of this stream. 

We need to talk to Jerry Hobbs to find out what to do from this point on. We first need to get the paperwork from the member. We will have a committee to discuss the changing of the by-laws, which will be by email, Chet, Tom, Sid, Gerald, and Don. Chet wants to prepare for the next Claims Manager now, so that it will be an easier transition.

It is with unbearable sadness that I must report that WSNFC President Robert Funkhouser died unexpectedly of a massive heart attack at his home, early in the morning of August 10. He was 50. Rob was a tireless advocate of free access to public lands for everyone. He worked the phones, networked among diverse groups, met with elected officials and their staffs, spent endless hours in research, testified in Congress and before many State and County elected bodies, and authored dozens of articles, opinion columns, and policy papers, all toward the goal of rolling back, first Fee Demo, and later the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act. He had some setbacks, but achieved many more successes. At the time of his death, he was extremely optimistic about legislation being drafted by Senator Max Baucus (D-MT) that promises to roll back the worst fee abuses by the public


