

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SAD NEWS FROM AUBURN

IN MEMORY

I am very sad to report the sudden and unexpected passing of Steve Doyle, last October. I am sorry to get this notice to you after so long a time. He went down on the job of an inner-cranial brain bleed in the brain stem; never regaining consciousness. He survived five days on a ventilator. He was only 64 years old; strong and healthy all of his life.

Steve had a passion for mining for gold long before he met Kay and married her. He loved it all; panning, high-banking, and dredging.

Steve and Kay have been members of the Auburn Chapter for many years, although unable to participate in outings as much as he would have liked due to his busy work schedule as a welding contractor.

Gold "We survived the Twain Ca. Bear! 2010"

Well, there is certainly more than one way to wake up! On the evening of September 3rd, 2010 at 11:45, close to midnight, all the Twain, CA UPI prospector camp sites were totally quite. Having had a long day, my son and I were fast asleep, as were most everyone else.

Suddenly there was a very loud thump sound on the tent wall. After the shock of being forced awake, my first greenhorn thought was who the heck just threw a large rock at our brand new tent? I asked my 27 year old son Chris if he did that. (Make the noise) No!

Not totally prepared, I finally found my flashlight and discovered a sizeable jagged hole in the tent window, about 18" above Chris's head. It was right through the screen and the window shade that had been zipped closed for the night. This could be trouble!

Still half awake I figured that I should yell something, what came out was "Get out of here!" I carefully shined the light through the same hole that the intruder had made, but I could not see or hear anything except my heart racing, and the shivering of my body standing there in my drawers in the 40 degree cool brisk night. I carefully unzipped a couple more windows to check if I could see our midnight creeper. I could not see his eye reflection, and the quiet silence was abundant. I wondered if old grumpy would circle back for another round.

The claw / paw hole was about 11" wide at the base and in a semi-triangle shape, upwards to about 8" high, with jagged tear marks hanging down, like neatly spaced triangles. We could see where the claws had pierced the material and tore the window covering downward leaving a hole large enough to put my head through.

We heard the neighbor's son yell something short like "get" & clapped his hands. The experienced young man had been sleeping on a pad in the open air, as he was accustomed to do when he works on the fire lines. I carefully went outside to look around and warn my neighbors that a bear had just torn a hole in our tent. We later found out that the young man had actually shined his flashlight on the black bears face and he could see old Smokey's eyes and mouth only 20' away. It was about level with his chest. After the clapping noise the bear ambled off through the brush. I think dad's tent became a little more occupied for the night.

No, there was absolutely no food, tooth paste, hair spray, shampoo, gum or candy of any kind inside the tent, only two sleeping prospectors. (One was snoring, could that have been a challenge to the bear.) The bear did not mess with the coolers or food outside the tent.

At the Saturday's pot luck and raffle we received some welcomed good advice from the experienced prospectors about camp protection. A bear can smell 100 times better than us, which is how they make a living. A cheap simple blend of ¼ ammonia (or stronger) and ¾ water in a spray bottle sprayed nightly around your tent and over your ice chests, food etc is an effective deterrent. Ammonia actually hurts their sensitive noises.

Online I found out many people even spray around the doors & windows of their vehicle, especially if there is food and/or bucketed trash inside. It's a good idea to park a ways from your tent, but not to close to the other prospectors. Don't forget to spray your cook grill, plates, utensils even your hands after handling fish or meat etc. Spray your exhaust vent on campers also; think of the tempting odors there! Washing pots, pans, dishes and dumping the water near your tent may be an invite. Keep in mind, a bear can smell a cooked strip of bacon a mile away, wow! I think I can do that too, and also smell those pancakes at breakfast time! Mmmm.







Another good "WHAT'S COOKIN Recipe



CEDAR PLANKED SALMON ON A GAS BAR-B-CUE

2 1/2 TO 3 LBS Salmon Filet

Cedar Plank

Basting Sauce:

1/3 Cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil

1/3 Cup Butter

1/4 Cup Lemon Juice

2 Tablespoons minced fresh garlic

1 Tablespoon dijon mustard

Fresh finely chopped Italian parsley (can also add small amount of fresh dill)

salt and cracked pepper to taste

First soak the Cedar Plank in water for 45 minutes. This will prevent the plank from burning and help produce the cedar smoked flavor.

Combine the basting sauce ingredients in a glass measuring cup and microwave for approximately 2-3 minutes. Oil one side of the soaked plank with olive or canola oil and lay salmon filet on that side: baste the salmon with 1/2 of the sauce and let sit for a few minutes.

Turn on gas bar-be-cue and let heat to low medium.

Set plank on grill a few inches above the flame and close lid. The timing should be approximately 15 minutes per pound of salmon (depending on the bar-be-cue unit) Halfway through the cooking time, baste the filet with the remaining sauce. Do not turn the filet over. Check for doneness in the thickest part of the filet. DONT OVERCOOK!!! I like to serve the filet still on the plank and garnished with lemon wedges.

This is good with an oven roasted fresh vegetable dish (chunks of red peppers, sweet onions, zucchini, yellow squash, eggplant & tomatoes tossed with olive oil, sea salt, garlic & herbs) and roasted at 450 degrees for approximately 30 minutes, a simple lemon rice pilaf, AND warm crusty sourdough bread. A sparkling wine goes well, also.

Cedar Planks can be found at some sporting goods stores, Cabelas, specialty bar-be-cue stores, sometimes at Costco, and on line. Try them with steak, chicken, or pork chops also.
