
President



Assistant Claims Manager Report

Jim Madden

Last weekend Don Siegel and I were out driving around from Groveland up Hwy 140 and down to the UPI and Course gold claims. Everywhere we drove there creeks. were trees that had fallen. The storm that took down these trees was the same one that Steve Barnett reported on. Looking across the hills you could see hundreds of dead trees that got caught up in the fire that went through the area a few years ago. Many are still standing with no foliage and most of the bark gone. Heavy rains and high winds brought down many oak and pine trees and it seems like a good many of them fell across the roads. The CCC and others have been up in the area quite busy clearing the roads of the downed trees. Don and I hoisted 4 or 5 4ft oak logs into the back of his truck. No lack of firewood up there.

In Groveland where I have a house a large branch broke on one of the oak trees and put three holes in the neighbors garage roof. The tree trimmers are still busy doing clean up in the area in Pine Mountain Lake and Groveland. I got up

there a couple of weeks after the storm but had so much cleanup work to do I was unable to get out to take pictures of the creeks.

In Pine Mountain Lake they have a campground and Big Creek cuts through it. There is gold in the creek and I hope to get the time to test it. Downstream is a small dam that is no longer in use, beyond that is a lot of jumbled bedrock. We can mine there the same as any other place in CA. There is always someone panning, sluicing, or power sluicing the stream.

Don and I did fairly well booming on one of the claims. We also collected some nice vug hole quartz from one of the winzes of a mine. I already have most of that crushed to 1/4 inch and the the finer particles (about half a gallon) I ran on my wave table and found gold. Of course you need a 100 power microscope to see it.

The gold is waiting to be found out there. Those rains moved a lot of material into the streams I am expecting a banner year for mining. From Wikipeia

Vugs are small to medium-sized cavities inside rock that may be formed through a variety of processes. Most commonly cracks and fissures opened by tectonic activity (folding and faulting) are partially filled by quartz, calcite, and other secondary minerals. Open spaces within ancient collapse breccias are another important source of vugs. Vugs may also result when mineral crystals or fossils inside a rock matrix are later removed through erosion or dissolution processes, leaving behind irregular voids. The inner surfaces of such vugs are often coated with a crystal druse. Fine crystals are often found in vugs where the open space allows the free development of external crystal form. The term vug is not applied to veins and fissures that have become completely filled, but may be applied to any small cavities within such veins. Geodes are a common vug formed rock, although that term is usually reserved for more rounded crystallined cavities in sedimentary rocks and ancient <u>lavas</u>.[1]

Letters To The Editor







This winter we have had some terrific rainstorms, today was the worst rainstorm that I have seen in the 15 years. Maxwell creek was as high as I have ever seen it in the 17 years I have lived here. The water is roaring and rushing down the creeks. At Jackass Creek, down near the Moccasin claim, the water is terrifically deep.

Down at the Moccasin generator plant for the Hetch Hetchy Mocassin Creek is tunneled. There is a dam that has a tunnel underneath the San Francisco water supply. Upstream from this dam is another smaller dam that has railroad ties sticking up at an angle to collect the trash so it does not flow into the second dam or into the lake. The water was flowing so high and fast it was flowing over the top of the debris catchers and the top of the second dam with the tunnel and into the Hetch Hechy water supply.

It was quite a violent storm, to date we have had a measured 53" of water that is washing more gold down the hills for us.

At the bridge here in Coulterville, Maxwell creek was about 80 ft wide. Down by the Potasi Mill site upstream from the Billy Goat claim Blacks Creek was over 100 ft wide. Ray Budowich and I have been driving around looking at these things hoping we will find more gold this summer and have more gold in our pan.
