



MLRC need not elaborate on the fact that our country is at war. Our concerns are herein directed to the safety of detectorists and recreational mineral hunters as they go about their hobby. All of you need to understand the changes that have occurred will have an effect on each of you and it is to this end that we issue the following tips.

Our sources have told us that all law enforcement agents at all levels including those types employed by public land management agencies have been placed on a very high alert which means they will be especially touchy. This means you are going to have to be on alert yourselves.

We realize that in the past some of you have taken occasion to "sneak" onto certain lands under the control of the military, air terminals, power plants and other areas usually closed to trespass. We urge you to cease this activity for your own protection. The reasoning should be clear.

Always carry with you adequate identification should you be questioned. Now is not the time to be the rugged individualist. Of course MLRC is referring to those instances when such a request for identification is reasonable such as being near a military facility. Because our country is at war does not mean your rights can be violated at a whim nor should you be treated in other than a respectful manner. If this does occur please notify MLRC.

There may be some government zealots who will attempt to use this situation to try to convince detectorists and others public lands have been closed due to "security reasons". In the past we've heard worse. Pubic lands are remaining open to public use. President Bush has urged the population to go about their normal routine and these activities are a part of some people's routines. If this type of action is pulled on you leave without argument then contact the district office of the agency involved, your club, and MLRC.

Next is a rather delicate issue but it needs to be raised. Americans of Middle Eastern decent do indulge in detecting and gold hunting; as well they should have every right to do. Race & religion should not play a role in events such as what is happening now but unfortunately they often do. We ask all of you to be especially careful.



We also ask the club members in those groups where persons of Middle Eastern decent are members to gather round them to make sure their rights are equally protected. We must always remember that being an American means more than just a word.

If you should see something out of place such as a package with no one around or a group of people acting suspiciously around a sensitive area do something about it. Report it.

There are several other preventative actions we all need to take. We ask you all to be alert and be careful. Our world has changed and we must change with it.

Subject: Mining Rules to Be Eased Tuesday, October 30, 2001 The Associated Press

"RENO, Nev. - Mining industry leaders cheered and environmentalists threatened legal action after the Bush administration announced a plan to repeal Clinton-era mining regulations as a step toward reversing declines in mine expansion and exploration.

The changes, announced last week by the Interior Department, eliminate the interior secretary's shortlived authority to block new mines on federal land where they could harm communities and the environment.

The rules were adopted under President Clinton at the urging of environmentalists, but Interior Secretary Gale Norton put such veto power on hold when she took office in January. The power will be eliminated for good as part

of the new rules, scheduled to go into effect today.

"I'm happy to work with the environmental community on mining reform, but they want all or nothing, so they are getting nothing," Reid said.

The value of mining for metals in the United States fell from \$13 billion in 1996 to \$9.9 billion in 2000, the National Mining Association said.

"Mine development is down 85 percent over the last five years and that's strictly because of the kind of rules" put in place under the Clinton administration, said Dave Hyatt, Glamis Gold Ltd.'s vice president for investor relations in Reno.

Lexi Shultz, legislative director for the Mineral Policy Center, a conservation group based in Washington, said Norton was turning "her back on the Western communities she claims she wants to engage."

"Instead of listening to the voices of Western citizens who have been calling for reform of an irresponsible mining industry, Secretary Norton seems only to heed the demands of that industry," she said."

The second year he moved on to Angels Camp, San Andreas, Jackson, and Fiddletown with the same sorry results just enough gold to keep him warm through the winter.



third and on and on he went picking out one golden nugget after the other.


